

Census by the Numbers

3.9 million: number of people counted in 1790, in the US's first-ever Census. Back then, the count was conducted by federal marshals on horseback and took 18 months to complete.¹

281 million: number of people counted in Census 2000.¹

12: number of pages the Census long-forms were in 2000.¹

1: number of pages the Census form will be in 2010.¹

140,000: number of Census enumerators currently out in neighborhoods verifying 145 million addresses.²

3.8 million: eventual total number of 2010 Census workers.³

10,000: running number of organizations currently partnered with Census 2010.⁴

70,000: number of Questionnaire Assistance Centers and Be Counted sites for Census 2010.⁵

3.1 million: est. number of people counted twice in 2000 Census.⁶

6.4 million: est. number of people missed in 2000 Census (mostly lower income, racial and language minorities, and children).⁶

\$478 million: est. amount of net federal funds lost to the states for the 2002-2012 period due to the undercount in Census 2000.⁶

10: number of years of federal dollars the Census determines.³

4:1: rate at which Latinos were more likely to be missed in Census 2000.⁶

7:1: rate at which Native Americans were more likely to be missed in Census 2000.⁶

6.4 million:

est. number of people missed in 2000 Census (mostly lower income, racial and language minorities, and children).
